

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
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
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Buoyohboy

Boating Course

Piloting

Prerequisite for this course is the Boating course. This course builds on the Boating course and enhances your positioning, plotting and navigational skills by teaching higher levels with regards to navigational and plotting skills, seamanship skills along with boat and hull capabilities. Course content includes bearings and fixes, dead reckoning and the log, marlinspike, distance of an object by two relative bearings, tides and tidal current, seamanship skills for adverse weather change and many more.

Course Start Date: Thursday, September 07, 2006

Length of Course: 17 weeks

Cost: \$140.00

Advanced Piloting

Prerequisite for this course is the Piloting course. In this course, the student learns advanced coastal navigation principles so as to be able to determine where the boat is at all times. Methods of determining the vessel's position are covered, using landmarks and government aids to navigation, allowing for current, leeway, tides and tidal currents. Course content includes charts, the compass, steering and timing a course, tides and tidal currents, effect of current and leeway, methods of determining position, running fixes, aids to navigation and electronic navigational aids.



Buoyohboy - Answers to the four questions

1. A starboard bifurcation buoy 2. Keep it on you starboard side. 3. A red light that flashes twice and after a brief pause, it flashes once more. Every ten seconds, this pattern is repeated. 4. This is an east cardinal buoy. Go to the east of this buoy. There is no choice in this matter.
